LOOKING FOR PRACTICAL SOLUTIONS TO KEEP YOUR CAT SAFE WHILE PROTECTING BIRDS?

Domestic cats (Felis catus) can make wonderful pets. But cats that roam outdoors can have serious consequences.

Across the globe, cats have been introduced into new habitats by people with terrible results. Outdoors, cats are a non-native and invasive species that threaten birds and other wildlife, disrupt ecosystems, and spread diseases. Now numbering well over 100 million in the United States, cats kill approximately 2.4 billion birds every year in the U.S. alone, making cat predation by far the largest source of direct, human-caused mortality to birds.

American Bird Conservancy's *Cats Indoors* program educates the public and policy makers about the many benefits to birds, cats, and people when cats are maintained indoors or under an owner's direct control. In addition to advocating for responsible pet ownership solutions, we also oppose Trap, Neuter, Release (TNR) for feral cats because of the persistent and severe threats posed by these cats on the landscape.

ABC is leading a movement to overcome local and national challenges caused by roaming cats through science-based policies and management. The organization invites you to join a growing network of diverse stakeholders, such as animal shelters, veterinarians, wildlife rehabilitators, and conservation biologists, to build a future that is better for cats, better for birds, and better for people.
