Join Mark and Sheila as they share some of their favorite spots for birding between the western edge of Worcester County and the Connecticut River. This is an area with a lot of species diversity that few birders visit regularly. There are great spots for breeding warblers, migrating waterfowl, and hawk watching --- and it's all just across the border!

Mark Lynch is a long-term teacher and trip leader for Broad Meadow Brook. He was one of the founding members of the Massachusetts Avian Records Committee and is currently the book review editor for the journal Bird Observer.

Mark was a regional editor for *The Bird Finding Guide to Western Massachusetts* and contributed many chapters. For over 30 years, Mark was a teacher and docent at the Worcester Art Museum and has done extensive research and lecturing about using art museums as important resources in natural history studies. Mark also hosts INQUIRY on WICN (90.5 FM), a weekly interview that marries his interests in art, nature, and science.

Sheila Carroll has been an avid birder and photographer for more than 35 years. She does all the photography for Mark's birding classes and programs and coleads trips with him. Besides birds, Sheila is passionate about finding and identifying dragonflies and damselflies.

Mark and Sheila were the Central Massachusetts Regional Coordinators for the massive multi-year Massachusetts Breeding Bird Atlas II conducted by Mass Audubon.
