EAST QUABBIN LAND TRUST SEEKS TERRACORPS/AMERICORPS YOUTH EDUCATION COORDINATOR

East Quabbin Land Trust, based in Hardwick, is seeking applicants to fill the 2023-2024 Youth Education Coordinator position. What does a Youth Education Coordinator (YEC) do? The coordinator helps build the long-term capacity of the land trust by engaging youth in science and nature learning projects. Typically the YEC collaborates with local schools, libraries, and youth groups on projects that connect young people to the natural world. The desired qualifications include strong writing and verbal communication skills; the ability to work both independently and as a team member; some experience in training and educating community members and volunteers; a strong interest in/experience with hands-on land management or stewardship projects; and more.

This is a TerraCorps/AmeriCorps service position that offers a modest living allowance, a \$6,895 Education Award upon completion of 1700 hours of service, individual health care coverage, and many other benefits.
