BLUE TRAIL GUIDE FOR WARE RIVER IS IN THE WORKS

The Chicopee 4Rivers Watershed Council is a recently-formed group which sees itself as a voice for the local rivers. The Council is in the process of developing a Blue Trail map guide for the Ware River. This guide will inform paddlers about both human and natural history on the river way--Hardwick/Wheelwright, through Gilbertville and Ware, and terminating in Palmer/Thorndike.



A Blue Trail (also known as water trail) is a dedicated stretch of river that enjoys special clean water safeguards and is a destination for fishing, boating and other recreation. Just as hiking trails are designed to help people explore the land, blue trails help people discover rivers. Blue trails provide a fun, exciting way to get kids outdoors, connect communities to treasured landscapes, and

are economic drivers benefiting local businesses and quality of life. Blue Trails become a community resource.

Make sure the time/date settings are recorded. The goal is to get as many points as possible. Maximum for this list: 77 points. Reduce the size of your photos (< 1 MB each) and send to <u>warerivernatureclub@yahoo.com</u> by midnight on Saturday, May 10th.

Top three scorers will be announced Wednesday, May 13th. For prizes, top scorers will be able to choose one book from among a variety of recently-acquired natural history titles.
