VOLUNTEER WANTED: NESTBOX MONITOR IN BARRE

At a small DCR parcel called Riis Hill, on Route 62 in Barre, WRNC volunteers and others have placed a small number of bluebird/swallow nestboxes and one kestrel box. In addition, we're monitoring for the presence of Bobolinks at the site. We're seeking a volunteer who can make observations there 2-4 times monthly, May-August. The boxes and surrounding landscape may be viewed with binoculars where close access is difficult.

As vegetation grows in along the old roadway the trail gets a bit harder to manage; mowing takes place late in the season. In addition, the short climb to a view of the kestrel box and open field is steep. Ticks are present here as they are everywhere in the Ware River Watershed.

We're the first to admit that this site is a monitoring challenge! The reward is an opportunity for quiet observation of birds that prefer the open, shrubby habitat, such as Indigo Buntings, various warblers, Tree Swallows, and Eastern Bluebirds, as well as a peaceful, unobstructed view of open sky—think raptors in flight!—from the hilltop. More detailed information is available to anyone interested in this effort.
