MONTHLY PROGRAMS AT RUTLAND LIBRARY ARE ON AGAIN!



SORROWFUL INCIDENT AT FOSTER PARROTS SANCTUARY



In March, 2020, the coronavirus pandemic brought our monthly programs and educational presentations to a halt. We were sorry to have to cancel the scheduled talk by two dedicated staff members of Rhode Island-based Foster Parrots Ltd.

Although we had hoped to reschedule the program, the Sanctuary experienced a tragic event on April 1, 2021 when a devastating fire destroyed their facility. The lives of 95 beloved animals were lost. The website states: "Each [of the animals] had beautiful and unique personalities and were loved dearly by our

staff and volunteers. All of the surviving animals are currently safe and stable. We have a long road ahead as we continue to care for our residents and begin rebuilding from the ground up. Our entire sanctuary facility will need to be rebuilt."

IDENTIFYING HAWKS IN FLIGHT

Every autumn millions of hawks migrate south, providing the best opportunities to see them in flight. However, identifying hawks in flight is very different from seeing them close-up in photos. This online presentation will introduce you to the eleven most commonly seen hawks in New England, providing the 'keys' and a few tricks for you to begin identifying them at a distance on your own.

By the end of the course, you'll know where and when to look for them, and how to identify what you find.

Paul Roberts has been studying hawks, their migration, and identification for several decades. He founded the Eastern Mass Hawk Watch (1976) and is past president of the NorthEast Hawk Watch.

Online program— FALL BIRD PHOTOGRAPHY

Three Saturdays: September 11th, 18th, 25th 10:00 a.m. - noon

Learn how to move beyond in-focus branches and out-of-focus birds in this hands-on online bird photography workshop with expert avian photographer Eduardo del Solar. Improve your technical and artistic photography skills by practicing on song birds, warblers, and seashore birds during fall migration.

Classes focus on the skills needed to capture birds in flight, and with portrait, environmental, behavioral, and artistic modes. Skills practice will take place between classes, followed up with sharing and reviewing with the class. Processing and tweaking images using a raw converter like Adobe Lightroom will be covered. Each student will also receive one additional hour of individual instruction.

DSLR and Mirrorless cameras with full auto and manual functions and telephoto capabilities are ideal for this class. All skill levels welcome although some knowledge of advanced camera functions is helpful.

BIRD MIGRATION AT BROWN HILL WACHUSETT MEADOW WILDLIFE SANCTUARY PRINCETON

September is the time of year when birds are moving south.

The destination on this hike is Brown Hill, at 1,312 feet the highest elevation on the Sanctuary. While at the summit, take in the view of one of the possible flight paths followed by hawks as they fly over Wachusett Mountain. There will be a short discussion of how to differentiate hawks in flight. Throughout the program, we'll also be on the lookout for other migrating birds, including fall warblers, sparrows, and more. Expect a moderately strenuous walk of approximately three miles.

In this illustrated talk, nature artist Barry Van Dusen will take us on trips around the corner and across the globe. Come along to see some spectacular scenery, meet some interesting people, and, of course, see some good birds! Barry will share his experiences as Artist-in-Residence at several museums and botanic gardens around New England. We'll then accompany him and a team of international artists as they travel to far-off destinations with the Artists for Nature Foundation-- the fenlands of England, the coastal forests of Peru, and a bird migration hotspot in Israel. Finally, we'll visit Maine, with stops at the Rangeley Lakes region and Acadia National Park.

Barry will be offering for sale original watercolors, notecards, and prints.

Barry W. Van Dusen is an internationally recognized wildlife artist living in central Massachusetts. His articles and paintings have been featured in Bird Watcher's Digest, Birding, and Yankee magazines, and he has illustrated a variety of natural-history books and pocket guides.

In 1994, Barry was elected a full member of London's Society of Wildlife Artists. His work has been exhibited regularly in the prestigious Birds in Art Exhibition (Wausau, Wisconsin), as well as in many galleries in the United States and Europe. At the invitation of the Artists for Nature Foundation, Barry has traveled to Spain, Ireland, England, Israel, India and Peru, working alongside other wildlife artists to raise money for conservation of threatened habitats.
